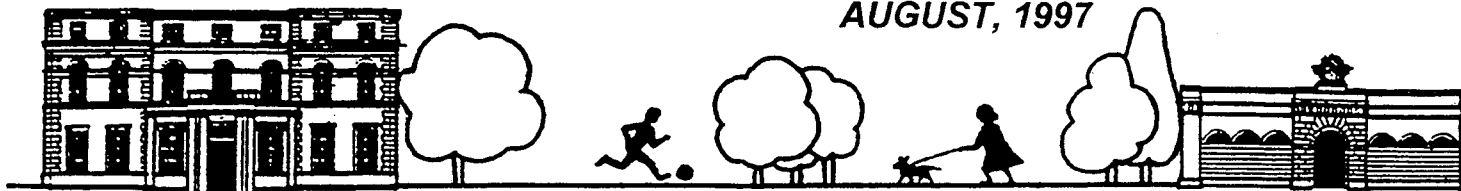

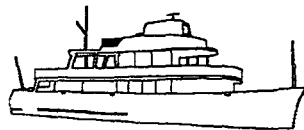
**Down at Potomac Lake things are looking up. Mr Ian Miller of County Fisheries has taken over the fishing lease. His team have already begun clearing away rubbish and reinforcing the banks to halt further erosion. Future plans include re-planting water lilies and reed beds and repairing paths.**

**Season tickets at £45 have already sold out, but fishing by the day at £6 (concessions £4), and by the night £4 (concess. £3) are available. A £10 ticket is also available which enables people to fish until 10pm.**

**Bailiffs are now on site 24 hours a day.**

**Supervised fishing classes for children and beginners are available at reasonable rates.**

## Day Trip to Waddesdon Manor



Over 50 members of both Brentford & Chiswick History Society and the Friends of Gunnersbury Park & Museum spent "A Day with the Rothschilds" in July. The weather was perfect as we visited the extraordinary museum of natural history in Tring, before travelling on to Waddesdon Manor. Waddesdon is the Victorian recreation of a French chateau set in Buckinghamshire countryside...

The Tring museum, opened in 1992, was created by Lionel Walter Rothschild (1868 - 1937). It contains a large collection of preserved animals and insects which Rothschild began collecting from the age of seven. This includes zebras, giant tortoises, and fat dormice - the latter Rothschild introduced from the continent and they are still only found at Tring. Some collections have also been added by the Natural History Museum since Rothschild's death: most extraordinary is a wonderful one of domestic dogs. No-one will assemble a comparable collection again because we are now able to record animals on film, and are sensitive to the needs of rare breeds.

We arrived at Waddesdon Manor, 30 minutes drive from Aylesbury, at lunchtime. Its creator, Baron Ferdinand, was a member of another branch of the Rothschild family. Waddesdon is now one of the National Trust's flagship properties and enormous sums have been spent on refurbishment. We enjoyed a guided tour of the ground floor, and explored upstairs ourselves. The wine cellars are open for visitors, as is a large shop. There is an excellent restaurant, and also a summerhouse serving teas near a large aviary. The spacious gardens are beautifully laid out.
